# **Fantasy & Science Fiction**

<u>Bellevue</u> – Robin Cook. As Dr. Mitt Fuller begins his surgical residency at Bellevue Hospital, his sixth sense intensifies, leading him to uncover sinister connections between mysterious patient deaths and the dark secrets of an abandoned local psychopathic hospital.

<u>North is the Night</u> – Emily Rath. Two bold young women, Siiri and Aina, defy the gods and mortals, living and dead, with Siiri seeking the greatest shaman of legend to rescue Aina from the cruel Witch Queen, in a deluxe edition of a darkly mythical, Finnish folkloreinspired fantasy adventure.

<u>Mechanize My Hands to War</u> – Erin K. Wagner. Achilling nonlinear sci-fi novel examines androids as a labor force in conflict with both human farmers and homegrown militias in near-future Appalachia.

## **General Fiction**

<u>I Might Be in Trouble</u> – Daniel Aleman. After his second novel flops and his boyfriend leaves, David has an amazing night with a stranger from a dating app but wakes to find his date dead, so he and his literary agent, Stacey, try to untangle what happened.

<u>Private Rites</u> – Julia Armfield. In a world reshaped by unending rain, sisters Isla, Irene, and Agnes reunite after their father's death, only to uncover disturbing secrets in their childhood home that fracture their fragile bond and reveal a sinister purpose tied to their mother's disappearance and their imperiled world.

No Place to Bury the Dead – Karina Saiz Borgo. Angustias Romero loses her children to a mysterious plague but finds refuge within herself at Third Country, a cemetery run by Visitación Salazar, and Angustias and Visitación stand ground in a dispute with feared landowner Alcides Abundio.

<u>We Need No Wings</u> – Ann Davila Cardinal. *(September release)* Teresa Sanchez, a direct descendent of St. Teresa of Ávila, finds herself lost after her retirement ... until the day she begins to levitate.

<u>Sister Snake</u> – Amanda Lee Koe. Su, a sheltered wife of a conservative politician in Singapore, and her rebellious sister, Emerald, a New York sugar baby, are bound by a 1000-year-old secret from their past as snakes in Tang dynasty China, but their reunion in Singapore threatens to unravel their hidden identities.

<u>What It's Like in Words</u> – Eliza Moss. Approaching 30 and feeling adrift, Enola clings to a toxic relationship with an enigmatic writer, believing that she as a "Cool Girl" can handle the red flags, but over the course of twenty-four hours (and two years), she's forced to reevaluate her beliefs about love, family, friendship, and herself.

<u>Definitely Better Now</u> – Ava Robinson. Celebrating one year sober, Emma finds her carefully controlled life unravelling when her estranged father reappears, she's tasked with

planning the office holiday party and she meets a charming IT guy who challenges her to embrace imperfection.

<u>Rental House</u> - Weike Wang. Keru and Nate, a couple navigating the cultural divides between her strict Chinese immigrant family and his rural white roots, face the challenges of family tensions during a vacation, questioning their ability to bridge these differences while grappling with what it truly means to create and sustain a family.

## **Historical Fiction**

<u>In the Distance</u> – Hernan Diaz. *(October release)* A young Swedish immigrant finds himself penniless and alone in California. The boy travels east in search of his brother, moving on foot against the great current of emigrants pushing west. Driven back again and again, he meets criminals, naturalists, religious fanatics, swindlers, American Indians, and lawmen, and his exploits turn him into a legend.

<u>Melvill</u> – Rodrigo Fresan. (*October release*) Based on Herman Melville and his father Allan Melvill—plowing through childhood days at the bedside of a hallucinated man and nights as a twilight writer who no longer wields a pen nor harpoon— *Melvill* goes on the hunt for the enigma of the always orphaned literary vocation, for the legacy of family stigma, the steersmen of fiction, and the castaways of reality.

<u>The Champagne Letters</u> – Kate Macintosh. In 1805 Reims, Barbe-Nicole Clicquot, determined to build a premier champagne house despite her husband's death, navigates war, competition, and court politics, while in present-day Paris, Natalie Taylor, inspired by Clicquot's letters, seeks to rebuild her life after a divorce and faces a life-changing decision.

<u>Sweet Vidalia</u> – Lisa Sandlin. Eliza Kratke's stable life in the Bayard, Texas, of 1964 is shattered by her husband's sudden death, uncovering long-hidden secrets that force her to confront the illusions that shaped her existence and inspiring her to rebuild her life far outside of her comfort zone.

<u>The Rest is Memory</u> – Lily Tuck. In a fictionalized retelling of a real-life tragedy, fourteen-year-old Czeslawa's brief life, from her upbringing in a Polish village to her death at Auschwitz, is explored alongside the broader suffering of millions during the German occupation, bringing her forgotten story to light.

## **Mystery & Detective**

<u>The Secret of the Three Fates</u> – Jesse Armstrong. American heiress Ruby Vaughn and her employer, Mr. Owen, are drawn into a dangerous investigation after a séance at Manhurst Castle ends in murder, forcing them to uncover long-buried secrets and clear their names with the help of folk healer Ruan Kivell before they become the next targets.

<u>Perfect Storm</u> – Paige Shelton. Beth Rivers and her boyfriend, Tex, quickly leave Benedict, Alaska, to hide from her one-time kidnapper, Travis, and then return with the widow of a recently murdered man for Police Chief Gril to investigate, who then disappears.

<u>Trouble Island</u> – Sharon Short. On Trouble Island in Lake Erie, maid Aurelia Escalante, secretly a gangster's wife in hiding, faces escalating dangers when her employer, Rosita, the wife of a notorious gangster, disappears and is later found dead.

#### Romance

<u>Eddie Winston is Looking for Love</u> – Marianne Cronin. Ninety-year-old Eddie Winston, a lifelong romantic who has never been kissed, embarks on an unexpected adventure with grieving young woman, Bella, to finally find love and discover the enduring power of friendship and second chances.

<u>Love You a Latke</u> – Amanda Eliot. (*October release*) Love comes home for the challahdays in this sparkling romance. Over latkes, doughnuts, and winter adventures in Manhattan, Abby begins to realize that her fake boyfriend and his family might just be igniting a flame in her own guarded heart.

## **Short Stories**

Mark Twain's Tales of the Macabre and Mysterious – Mark Twain. (September release) Brought vividly to life by nearly 70 entirely original and realistic illustrations, these tales place characters in macabre and inexplicable situations, send them into remote dimensions of time and space, and have them commit terrible crimes, make incredible mistakes, and play fantastic tricks on one another. Readers will find this collection eye-opening, chilling, and thought-provoking ... but also full of laughs!

## Suspense

<u>Locked In</u> – Jussi Adler-Olsen. Detective Carl Mørck, head of Department Q, is framed for a violent case from his past, so his colleagues Rose, Assad, and Gordon ignore direct orders to find answers and free Carl from Copenhagen's Vestre prison, where there's a million-dollar bounty on his head to ensure he doesn't talk.

<u>Tom Clancy Defense Protocol</u> – Brian Andrews. As Chinese President Li Jian Jun plans a secret military takeover of Taiwan, Defense Minister Qin Haiyu seeks asylum with the CIA, prompting a covert task force led by John Clark and Lt. Commander Katie Ryan's defense of Taiwan, while President Jack Ryan races to prevent a catastrophic war.

<u>Stuart Woods' Golden Hour</u> – Brett Battles. Former CIA operative Teddy Fay embarks on a European press tour for a film while secretly investigating the mysterious deaths of former colleagues linked to a past mission, all while evading assassins determined to expose his identity.

<u>Havoc</u> – Christopher Bollen. Eighty-one-year-old widow Maggie Burkhardt seeks refuge at the Royal Karnak, but when she befriends a troubled young mother and her mischievous son, she unwittingly opens her heart to a challenge that tests her resolve like never before.

<u>The Resurrectionist</u> – A. Rae Dunlap. In 19th century Scotland, when real-life serial killers Burke and Hare terrorized the streets of Edinburgh, a young medical student is lured into the illicit underworld of body snatching.

<u>Deadbeat</u> – Adam Hamdy. After a devastating accident, Peyton Collard's life spirals, leading him to become a vigilante-for-hire and despite being haunted by his actions, he embarks on a dangerous quest to uncover the truth behind his mysterious employer.

#### **NONFICTION**

How To Laugh at Death and Taxes: What Executors, Willmakers, Heirs, and Beneficiaries Need to Know – Barbara Amsden. (June release) This book is for everyone at some time in their life. If you're breathing, this book's for you... or your parents, friends, teenagers moving into their first apartment, newlyweds, new parents, siblings, ... oh, and the person or people you name as executor. Hope to be a beneficiary or heir? Yup, you too. Think you can do it alone? Be my guest, but first Google "executor horror stories."

Age of Melt: What Glaciers, Ice Mummies, and Ancient Artifacts Teach Us About Climate, Culture, and a Future Without Ice – Lisa Baril. (September release) Explores the deep-rooted cultural connection between humans and ice through time while examining the artifacts being found in melting ice and what these artifacts reveal about culture, wilderness and what we gain when we rethink our relationship to the world of ice.

<u>Kissing Kevin: an American Nurse in the Vietnam War</u> – Sara Berg. (*June release*)

Berg's inspiring story, Kissing Kevin, shines a light in heart-wrenching detail on the arc of a young woman's life fresh from nursing school to a warzone in Vietnam. Her story takes us from northern California to the painful learning grounds of the 24th Evac Hospital in Long Binh, Vietnam, in 1970–1971. With clarity and urgency, Sara captures the experience of the kisses, touches, and losses of her time caring for her soldiers.

The Mysterious Case of Rudolf Diesel: Genius, Power, and Deception on the Eve of World War I – Douglas Brunt.
