Fantasy & Science Fiction

<u>To Ride a Rising Storm</u> – Moniquill Blackgoose. A young indigenous woman and her dragon fight for the independence of their homeland in this epic sequel to the bestselling and multi-award-winning *To Shape a Dragon's Breath,* "a remarkable novel that is bound to be a staple of fantasy shelves for years to come.

<u>George Falls Through Time</u> – Ryan Collett. *Less* meets the year 1300 in this exhilarating and thoughtfully genre-defying literary novel about a man transported through time in a moment of extreme stress, whose modern anxieties are replaced by medieval brutalities.

General Fiction

<u>Lost Lambs</u> – Madeline Cash. Follows a suburban family of five unspooling at the seams, navigating a disastrous open marriage, teenage rebellion, and an unexpected human trafficking/body-hacking crime conspiracy.

The Rest of Our Lives – Ben Markovits. (December release) When Tom Layward's wife had an affair twelve years ago, he resolved to leave her as soon as his youngest child left the nest. Now, while driving his college-bound daughter to Pittsburgh, he remembers his promise to himself. He is also on the run from his own health issues and a forced leave from work. So, rather than returning to his wife in Westchester, Tom keeps driving west, with the vague plan of visiting people from his past en route, maybe, to California. He's moving towards a future he hasn't even envisioned yet while he considers his past and the choices he's made that have brought him to this particular present. Pitch-perfect, tender, and keenly observed, this is a story about what to do when the rest of your life is only just the beginning of your story.

<u>This is Where the Serpent Lives</u> – Daniyal Mueenuddin. Moving from Pakistan's sophisticated cities to its most rural farmlands, this novel captures the extraordinary proximity of extreme wealth to extreme poverty in a land where fate is determined by class and social station. It paints a powerful portrait of contemporary feudal Pakistan, and a farm on which the destinies of a dozen unforgettable characters are linked through violence and love, resilience, and tragedy.

<u>Things That Are Funny on a Submarine But Not Really</u> – Yannick Murphy. (*November release*) A deeply funny and achingly honest coming-of-age story surfacing from the pressures of Navy life and the weight of what comes after.

<u>The Devil's Daughter</u> – Danielle Steel. Two diametrically different sisters--one calculating and egotistical, the other honorable, kind, and compassionate--clash in this compelling novel.

<u>Vigil</u> – George Saunders. An electric novel from the #1 New York Times bestselling, Booker Prize-winning author of *Lincoln in the Bardo*, taking place at the bedside of an oil company CEO in the twilight hours of his life as he is ferried from this world into the next. <u>Crux</u> – Gabriel Tallent. In this story of intense friendship and grit, two down-and-out teens escape their lives and chase a different future through rock-climbing.

<u>Just Watch Me</u> – Lior Torenberg. A bold debut about a charismatic misfit who livestreams her life for seven days and nights to raise money to save her comatose sister--a poignant and darkly funny exploration of grief, forgiveness, and redemption.

Historical Fiction

<u>The Last of Earth</u> – Deepa Anappara. A stunning historical novel set in nineteenth-century Tibet that follows two outsiders--an Indian schoolteacher spying for the British Empire and an English "lady" explorer--as they venture into a forbidden kingdom.

<u>The Friend of the Family</u> – Dean Koontz. A girl liberated from a carnival sideshow discovers her mysterious purpose in a moving novel about family, sacrifice, and transcendent love.

<u>This House Will Feed</u> – Maria Tureaud. Amidst the devastation of Ireland's Great Famine, a young woman is salvaged from certain death when offered a mysterious position at a remote manor house haunted by a strange power and the horror of her own memories in this chillingly evocative historical novel braided with gothic horror and supernatural suspense.

<u>The Bookbinder's Secret</u> – A. D. Bell. A young bookbinder begins a hunt for the truth when a confession hidden beneath the binding of a burned book reveals a story of forbidden love, lost fortune, and murder.

<u>Inside Man</u> – John McMahon. In this sequel to McMahon's electrifying series debut, *Head Cases*, Gardner Camden and the PAR team return to investigate potentially connected cases.

Romance

<u>Woman Down</u> – Colleen Hoover. In this twisty thriller from *New York Times* bestselling author Colleen Hoover, a frustrated author looks for her muse in a remote hideaway, but what she finds defies all expectations...and reality.
